Pastor's Path By: Rev. Chuck Cram

Several weeks ago I did something to my elbow that has been a little bothersome ever since. As I look back on my activity over the weeks, my best guess is that I may have hyper-extended the elbow just a bit, perhaps while carrying a sheet of plywood. It was just a slight annoyance until one day I was carrying a box on my shoulder and it started to slip off. Because I had something in the other hand, I tried to "catch" the box as it fell, without thinking about my elbow. Boy did that get my attention!

After a few days of being quite uncomfortable I finally went to the store a purchased an elbow wrap that seemed to ease the pain a bit. A few days later, Patty Mills, our resident physical therapist, gave me a different kind of wrap that worked even better! Thanks, Patty!

Apparently there is a tendon, or perhaps more than one, that needs to be held still and in place in order for it to heal. With just normal day-to-day movement, you can constantly re-injure the tendon and it will never heal and the pain will continue. I'm not a physician or a physical therapist so my explanation of this process is probably oversimplified, but you get the idea. I still wear my elbow wrap as the pain is still slightly present, but it is much better and I'm confident it will soon be gone.

I mention this process not to seek sympathy for my elbow, (although that is always appreciated) but rather to reflect on this idea of holding something still so it can heal. My thoughts go to the 46th Psalm where in verse 10 we are reminded to "Be still and know that I am God."

Life can be hard. There are things we wish we could control but we cannot. There are opportunities every day for our souls to get bruised and battered, for our Spirits to be tried and deflated. If we go through life and never take the time to be still, our spirits and our souls will never have the chance to heal; we will always be in pain.

There are many ways to "be still and know God" – it doesn't mean you have to be in church all the time. Some of my greatest Divine



connections come in the wilderness taking pictures, or just on a walk along the river, or perhaps on a bike ride or in a worship service. I also try to take a few minutes each day for meditation and prayer and that is effective as well. But if you think about your own spirits as tendons that stretch and respond to your daily trials, eventually, they will become over-stretched, or hyper-extended, just like my elbow. It is important

for us to wrap our spirits in the stillness and the presence of the Divine so our spiritual tendons will have a chance to heal.

May you find your place of stillness and heal your spirits daily. Unfortunately they don't sell a "Spiritual Wrap" at the drug store; you have to create it and find it on your own. You can do this throughout the day, even when stopped at a red light. Just focus on your breathing and perhaps repeat a mantra like "be still and know that I am God" or something else that is meaningful to you. Often I use "make me an instrument of thy peace" as a mantra. Even 10 or 15 seconds of that stillness can be refreshing and create some healing for your over-stretched spiritual tendons.

Go in peace and in stillness, Chuck.

Church Council Meeting Minutes October 20, 2015

Opening/Devotional: from Isaiah 43; opening prayer by Cottie. Pastor's Report: Since Phase One of the Revitalization Plan for a \$35,000 line of credit was approved by Charge Conference, held on Oct. 11, 2015, Chuck suggested setting one of these three areas as our first priority.

Entrance Fellowship Hall Exterior · Replace main · Replace concrete · Change to energy efficient windows entrances soffits entry patio · Add more handicapped · Paint exterior · Replace carpet & ceiling parking spots · Replace rain gutters · Update '70s look · Re-landscape (Wall hangings/graphics; dividers & cozy furniture) ·Sanctuary doors

Line of Credit proposals should be sought from 3 banking institutions. Twin Rivers, P1FCU and Zion were selected. Gary volunteered to gather information from them.

<u>Trustees:</u> Five people showed up for the Fall Work Day. Donations covered the cost of the hot dogs (cooked by Jim Hood). Monte cut 4 trees down and trimmed trees in the back. The berry tree in the island is on the chopping block for the next work day. Of the \$600 withdrawn from WesPath investment Fund, \$529.11 was used for flooring. Paint and baseboards still must be purchased. \$1,070.00 still remains in the WesPath account.

UMW: Kathy reported that the group will re-form from 2 circles to a single unit which will meet monthly beginning Jan 1, 2016.

Pumpkin Patch

We would like to thank everyone who helped with the Pumpkin Patch this year, because of you it was a great success. As of Friday, October 29th we made over \$5,000 in gross sales and gathered a grocery cart filled with canned food for the food bank. We had numerous community outreach opportunities including 165 kids from various schools and youth groups join us and about 20 residents from the Idaho Veteran's Home and Life Care for a bingo day. Great job everyone and thank you!!

Sound System Move Almost Complete

If you have been noticing a new structure popping up in the back corner of the sanctuary it is a new sound booth (really more of a desk). We are moving the control of the sound system to the rear of the sanctuary where an operator will be able to adjust volume levels as needed, run the PowerPoint from the computer, start movies or film clips and operate an electronic accompanist device called Hymnal Plus. We have also added another monitor which has been installed on the back wall of the sanctuary to keep the pastor, the accompanists, the choir and the liturgists all on the same "page" while facing the congregation.

For ease of operation and seamless transitions it is important for an operator to be in the sanctuary and have



the ability to adjust volume levels in "real time" or while it is happening. Not every liturgist, for example, speaks at the same volume or chooses to speak the same distance from the microphone. This causes fluctuations in being able to easily hear the call to worship clearly from week to week. The current volume control for all the

microphones is hidden behind the Chancel area and even if an operator were back there, they wouldn't have any idea if the volume was too loud or too soft. The same is true of prayer requests for the wireless mic, announcements and even volume of short videos or film clips we may utilize during worship. Special music is another challenge; while we do not currently mic the choir, for some other

softer instruments a microphone may be beneficial. This move will allow us greater flexibility and enhance the worship experience.

Of course improvements of this nature are not free. While hard costs for the project have been kept to an



absolute minimum through lots of donated material and labor, there have been considerable equipment expenses. The Memorials Committee has funded this project. These funds have been designated to be used for worship related expenses at the time the Memorials Committee was formed, so the funding seems appropriate. If you know of anyone who has donated to the Memorials fund, be sure to offer a comment of gratitude for their generosity; if you have contributed personally, take a moment to consider how important your gift has been in allowing us to enhance the worship experience. A special thanks to the Memorial Committee for their vision, trust and leadership in supporting this project. We are moving forward and the new sound desk is another example of that progress.



A Cookbook Committee has been gathering recipes and Arrie is helping and advising us as we prepare the all church cookbook. We are planning to have it ready to sell very early in December.


