As a young boy I grew up traveling during the summer months. Both my parents were educators, and so we had the summers free for the most part. We had a small travel trailer and usually drove a station wagon of some kind-"the rig" – as my dad used to call it, provided both transportation and housing for many a road trip across this great land of ours.

National Parks were always a favorite destination, as were all points west from Iowa. Colorado, Oregon and California were favorite states, as we had family in each location, and we would hop-scotch our way across the miles and see as much as we could in-between. At every stop, every National Park, every local point of

I worked for a time as a sports editor for a local paper – shooting pictures like crazy – but eventually deciding that the job involved far too many hours for far too little pay. What Can I Do?

This past Sunday you and I were asked to extend a personal effort into a program intended to provide access for people seeking to explore their spiritual side. In other words, "invite someone to church" – someone who you know that may fall into the "spiritual but not religious" category. The measure of success will be if more people get truly involved. We all know at least one other person who in spite of their knowledge of science and history plus all those life experiences still leaves a void of understanding of life and a spirituality yet to be explored . You may even hear someone say they are spiritual but not religious.

The program is designed to reach out to the many in the LC Valley who are forever turned off by the words

church, religion, or anything that sounds like it. So what can you do?

First, DON'T invite them to join you at CHURCH! Instead, tell them your most interesting HOBBY is you are part of a SPIRITUAL EXPLORATION GROUP. The group practices a rule – WE THINK... AND LET THINK. The group leader (code word for Pastor Chuck) always seems to have fresh, mind-expanding ideas at each get together. The group attendees each get to digest, talk and ask questions about the subject. All enjoy listening to at least most of what others, who are also exploring, have to say. Everybody gets to be right-so there's no judgment of one position over another or right and wrong answers. It's fun!

SO, what you can do is work at identifying one or two people you know that might not be offended by you telling them what your favorite hobby is. Then, commit to telling them about your "WE THINK AND LET THINK" Club this month (before Halloween!). Chuck will count shiny new faces on Sunday and Monday mornings (Preacher's Pub) plus Thursday evenings (book study) and ... well, we know there's always room for expansion and a further, we will be meeting the needs of others who did not know such a place as ours existed. You can't be "spiritual but not religious" without a spiritual journey, and we offer a very unique space to begin that spiritual journey. We should be proud of what we have and shout it from the rooftops... even if we have to shout it in code at first to get people interested!

spent away from home didn't seem to be worth it in the end. I considered self-employment and stock photography, but the internet and digital images began to change that market significantly. As marketing manager for an electronics firm in Dallas I worked in the studio with photographers and shared in some of the photo work, but again over time, the demands of the job seemed to outweigh the rewards. Even though I held a BFA in photography, I remember thinking one day that perhaps I needed to learn how to let go of the idea that photography needed to be the driving force of my chosen vocation. Perhaps I could choose something else; something that seemed completely non-related.

I entered seminary in 1996-letting go of the idea I needed to "work" in the photographic industry or related fields. It wasn't long before I began to realize that through letting go, I had secured the future of photography in my life. I now incorporate visuals and photography in many ways as part of my ministry; something I could not see in the beginning. It is possible, in fact likely, that my photography has found a greater voice in ministry than at any other

time in my vocational past.

This was also the time when digital photography was beginning to really come into its own, and I was still shooting film. The early digital cameras were slow and awkward and I wasn't all that computer savvy so the whole idea scared me a little bit. I was as afraid to let go of film and make the switch to digital; there were too many questions, too many new things and far too much to learn. I saw in myself that I was as reluctant to let go of film as I was to let go of photography as a vocation in the first place. Today, I shoot 100% digital and have never been happier with the equipment and the results.

Last Sunday I distributed a document that begins to outline a plan forward for the revitalization of Lewiston First United Methodist. Next Sunday we will be looking at all the ways it is possible for us to "let go" of things and make our lives better in the

process.


As we analyze and reflect on our conversations and our efforts as a group we may find that to create our futures, we may need to "let go" of a few things we have always thought we needed. After we let go, it is possible those same things may re-surface in new ways as we move forward in ministry with one another, and to the Valley at large. It takes courage to let go. I know – I've been there. But I have also seen the results.

Creating a sustainable future is going to move us into the great expanse of the unknown and learning to let go will become an important part of that process. I hope we have the courage to secure our future; we certainly have a good start; to quote Jonathan Livingston Seagull; "Break the chains of your thought, and you break the chains of your body, too..."

Because our sustainable future involves flying higher and farther and faster, we must break the chains of thought and let go.

# **FOUND MONEY**


