### Pastor's Path - Perspective is Everything By: Rev. Chuck Cram

There is a must-see feature in Yellowstone National Park called the Grand Prismatic geothermal pool. On our most recent vacation trip, Heidi and I had the opportunity to visit this geologic wonder-I must say, it is magnificent. But only from a certain

perspective.

Here's the deal. If you stop along the highway at the entrance to the Grand Prismatic and follow the boardwalk out to the pool, it is a rewarding experience. You get a sense of the size of the pool, and you can get a glimpse of the color every so often as the steam is whisked away by a slight breeze. You can observe the pool in sections only because

you are so close to the pool itself. The Grand Prismatic has a deep aqua-blue center and as the water gets shallow toward the edges of the pool, the color of the water turns to a more turquoise and then the entire pool has a ring of bacteria growth that is a rust color and the combination is serious beauty. But it is difficult to see the entire pool. You have to have the right perspective; and the correct perspective is not available from the boardwalk where about 98% of the visitors attempt to see the pool. It can't be done. In other words, if you want to truly see the Grand Prismatic geothermal pool, you have to hike and climb and scramble around on the mountainside a little bit – but the climb is worth it!

I mention this because United Methodist Communications is in the midst of a marketing campaign called "ReThink Church" which mirrors much of what we are trying to accomplish with our own campaign. RETHINK CHURCH helps local churches reach "seekers," the 42% of adults who aren't currently active or committed to church, but searching to give their lives deeper meaning. These people want to be a part of making the world a better place for all people. RETHINK CHURCH helps them see our church as a relevant place for that to happen.

### Pastor's Path - (continued)



The challenge for us is to "rethink church" from a new perspective. Those of us who have been attached to the church and involved in the church for several decades have trouble viewing the church from a new perspective. For example, the other day I asked a question of a group gathering in what ways might we be hindering the comfort level of visitors without even realizing it. I offered as an example the passing of the collection plate. Everyone is used to this idea that has attended church on a regular basis, but for a first time visitor, it could be intimidating or even embarrassing.

After my one example, no one could come up with any other ideas on ways we may be unintentionally not very welcoming. This told me how difficult it is to leave the comfort of our current perspective and hike, scramble, climb and work to leave that perspective behind and gain the benefit

of a new perspective-just like the Grand Prismatic. But this must be done.

Research indicates our target group of people we hope to attract to our worship service on Sunday mornings is very suspicious of institutions, tradition and structure. They are much more likely to join a

cause than an organization, have a passion for social justice, they use technology and are media savvy and they have far fewer hours available for volunteer work than people did two or three generations ago. They listen to contemporary music, communicate via text and e-mail almost exclusively, have a broad world perspective and tend to have a higher than average education level. These are things we should keep in mind as we plan on ways to become more welcoming to our visitors. But in order to truly "see" what needs to be done or what needs to change, it requires us to climb out of our comfort zone and look at the church from a new perspective.

When Heidi and I sought to find a new perspective to view the Grand Prismatic, it wasn't easy. The trail was steep:

there were loose rocks and dead trees to climb over; there were even signs warning us to stay on the trail. Had we not been motivated by a powerful desire to truly "see" the Grand Prismatic, it would have been very easy to just remain in the safety of our comfort zone.

In the months to come there will be things which may challenge your sense of comfort, there may be things with which you disagree, there may even be things which cause you to question if we are going in the right direction. When you experience these feelings, I ask for you to mentally climb out of your comfort zone and try to "ReThink Church" from a new perspective. When you do and when you can begin to "see" for the very first time, the climb will have been worth it.
