

Pastor's Pa "What Do I Tell My Friends" By: Rev. Chuck Cram

There is a State Park west of Boulder, Colorado called Eldorado Canyon State Park. This particular park holds special significance for me because I spent a number of summers there. The location is the same as it always has been; the rocks and the river and the canyon have not changed a bit over the years. But the park itself has been transformed on a number of levels.

When I was about 8 years old I was introduced to Eldorado for the very first time. I was there every summer until I celebrated my 13th birthday (in August) in the same place. I did a lot of growing up within those canyon walls, had a plethora of meaningful experiences and it has left me with a special fondness for a special place.



Briefly, here is the story. My dad was in school during the summer months in pursuit of his PHD while he taught physics during the regular school year at Westmar College in LeMars, Iowa. The University of Colorado at Boulder had a summer


program that worked with his schedule and his needs. Eldorado Canyon, because of its proximity to Boulder was the perfect place to camp for the family while dad went to school.

But back in the mid-1960's this magical place was not Eldorado Canyon State Park. It was a privately owned campground called Eldorado Springs. It was owned by the Fowler family and Bill Fowler and my father were good friends. As I said, we camped there, all summer, for 5 consecutive summers. The rest of my siblings, all who are older than I, had partial experiences with Eldorado. Sometimes they had jobs or travel or other obligations that kept them away some of the summers. I was the only child that was there every summer of our time there.

As time went on, the Fowler family aged and eventually wanted to retire. They started thinking about selling the campground, but there was little interest from anyone who wanted to keep it as a campground. There was a lot of maintenance and the profits were thin. There was, however, tremendous interest in the land from several mining companies. There is a high concentration of quartz in the area and the mining companies could foresee great profits from mining the area. I personally would have considered this to be a disaster.


In a very unique effort, the city of Boulder, the state of Colorado and a non-profit organization of concerned citizens all worked together to match the offer made by the mining company and this unlikely group

purchased the area from the Fowler



I tell this story only because I see some parallel experiences between Eldorado and the church. Those of us who grew up in the church remember it as it was and we want it to remain exactly as we remember it. Sometimes our desire for holding on to what we remember becomes a stumbling block for creative solutions. What might have happened if the owners of Eldorado had insisted that the area must continue as a campground? I shudder to think of the outcome of that scenario.

As it is, the very essence of the Eldorado experience remains intact; even though the area is no longer a campground and camping there is no longer allowed. It is a day use only state park
