Church Council Meeting Minutes August 25, 2016

In Attendance: Sue Driskill, Monte Boardman, Lani Hofer, Deb Snyder, Lois Chesnut, Chuck Cram, Cottie Hood Cottie opened the meeting with prayer. Minutes were accepted as printed in the July Newsletter

Finance Committee: Sue reported a current balance of \$7,026.30 in the Twin Rivers general account. The June & July Apportionments, each for \$1,562.10, are past due. Chuck recommend paying only the June bill now. Sue will take care of the paperwork to have Larry Butts and Rhonda Edens taken off the Twin Rivers account and the two new signers who were approved iat the July Council meeting (Sue & Lani) added. There is \$1,425.29 in the P1FCU Revitalization account with only 3 minor bills due.

Steering Committee: Chuck reported that the welcome center was completed but not in service yet. He has talked with Barb Maple about taking on organizing the welcome greeters, ushers and welcome center activities. He has a curriculum for the welcome training which will be offered in early September. He also talked about the graphics above the center and the need to paint and take care of flooring before that can be completed. A "paint day" will be planned sometime in September.

Monte reported that Flat Roof Systems came in with a bid of \$2115 for the roof over the narthex entrance. He hired them to do that work. A bid to remove the concrete where more handicapped parking will be came in at \$5,000. This includes sidewalk repair and asphalt in the parking area.

SPR: Cottie reported for Liz that all employees have agreed to return and agreements are in place. The Montessori school has been purchased by Kathleen Porter. Chuck will be on vacation the week of September 15-22 and Larry Fergusen will preach.

Trustees: Monte reported that the red rock on the south side of the building has been removed and would like imput on what to put in its place. Ideas from the congregation are welcome. The bushes winder the windows need to be trimmed and the bower has been repaired. He hired Hayden Enterprises to spray the lawn for weed and insect control.

Monte said that an offer of \$37,000 has been accepted for the large lot and the sale should close the first part of September.

Worship: Cottie reported for Meuriel that the seasonal themes have been set, the bell storage has been moved and accompanists are scheduled from Sept.-May. Lois reported a need to do something with the storage area behind the alter where the communion supplies are stored. Monte is going to take care of that storage and arranging the candelabrum for easier access.

Pastor's Report: Chuck discussed the need for a church credit card to be used for ordering office supplies online, travel and registrations. After discussion is was moved by Lani, seconded by Monte and passewd that the church apply for a credit card through Twin River and the balance be paid every month.

Chuck discussed working with the new owner of the Montessori school and trying to involve the sudents with some kind of church activities. Cottie suggested an Ad Hoc Committee to discuss how this might work.

Chuck also reported that the office needs to purchase a wireless keyboard and mouse as well as AV Defender (an antivirus/backup system) for the new computer as well as the existing computers. Lois moved, Monte seconded and it was passed that these purchases be made.

Chuck showed the group the "Peace Pole" that will be dedicated at church this Sunday. The group went out to the patio to discuss location of the pole.

Old Business: Deb reported that she has been working on the upcoming Pumpkin Patch. Delivery date is Oct 15th at 11am. The Patch will be open from 10:00-6:00. She and Cottie are working on getting student groups or the LC Loggers to help unload. Monte will have a fork lift this year to help with unloading of pallets. He also located pallets for use to display the pumpkins.

New Business: Deb discussed Vision of Hope, a spirit-based yoga class with Rev. Kay Totten. Deb moved, Lois seconded and the council passed a motion to have the classes held at FUMC Sept. 28th-Dec 14th. Deb is also working with a Tai Chi instructor for a future class.
