"Revitalization Recap" By: Rev. Chuck Cram

I don't remember much from 7th grade. I think most of my early junior high experience wasn't all that great and it kind of all runs together into a coalesced mass of memories that one would do well to just forget. Except for Mechanical Drawing and Drafting - it was a class that was required for all 7th grade boys - I'm not sure what the girls were doing-but this class was for the boys. I'm sure they couldn't get away with such a thing today.

Sometime in the winter months of my 7th grade year I began a class of Mechanical Drawing and Drafting. I hated it at first. Who wants to draw what a coffee can looks like from five different views? I found it sort of boring and pointless – I guess my vision was a bit limited in the 7th grade - go figure. But then something happened.....

We quit drawing cylinders and blocks and such and began a new unit on floor plans. We had about two or three weeks to draw a workable floor plan for a house. This connected with me - for once I could see beyond the end of the school day or even beyond making it into the 8th grade - I could see myself actually designing and building a house!

Which I did, but that's another story.

Floor plans made sense – and the process of drawing a floor plan tapped into my creativity in such a way that the expression CONTINUED ON PAGE 2

of those creative thoughts on paper in the form of a floor plan wasn't homework-it was play. I completed the assignment of a single workable plan in about two days. So I drew another and turned it in for extra credit. Then another, and another – 15 in all, if I remember right, is how many plans I turned in over the course of those three weeks. I would draw in study hall, draw during math class, draw at night watching TV, and who knows when else. It was fun.

There was a certain anticipation that accompanied the beckoning blank sheet of paper that stared back at you as the plan moved from sketches or thoughts into clean straight lines on your drafting board. All the decisions, all the options, all the possibilities were new and exciting and each decision you made impacted the next. If you wanted two bathrooms, it's better if they are back to back; is the kitchen going to look out into the back yard or the front? Where are the stairs to the basement going to be and how many bedrooms will there be? I still retain a certain passion for floor plans and I guess I always will.

More than you wanted to know about 7th grade drafting, right? Probably. But despair not, there is a point.

In September of 2015, about two years ago, I first filled a few blank sheets of paper with dreams, hopes and aspirations that I called a plan for revitalization. That original document was designed to be an outline of how we might progress through several phases of this revitalization plan. Now, two years later, we have completed phase one; on time, on budget and with great results! Our dreams, our hopes and our aspirations have become manifest around us. What moves the non-physical into the physical is the process of thought. Those 15 floor plans did not exist in the physical world until through the process of thought, I brought them out of the non-physical and in to the physical and onto that sheet of paper. Revitalization is exactly the same.

What dreams and aspirations do you have for your church? We want to know, we want to hear from you, we want everyone to participate. It really is a remarkable opportunity to declare the past as past and the future as a clean sheet of paper. We can do or become or achieve anything as a church; the process begins with the first thought, and then begins to move from the non-physical into the physical, from the invisible into the visible and from the unbelievable into the believable.

Create a new document in your thought process about what phase two might look like; create a new plan-create your bliss. Then share your plan with the Revitalization Steering Committee, or better yet, join the committee yourself. You can do it you know, because as the scripture says; "we are co-creators with Christ."

We can be proud of how far we have come and we will celebrate those victories in October, but the future we create for phase two is really up to us. The blank sheets of paper beckon us to dream big, beckon us toward creative solutions and our momentum confirms that "all things are possible through Christ who strengthens us."

Faith & Fellowship


Everyone is welcome when the Faith & Fellowship Adult Sunday School Class resumes.

Cleaning Kits

Value: \$65.00 per kit Cleaning Kit Materials

- 1 5-Gallon bucket with resealable lid
 - o Buckets from fast-food restaurants or bakeries can be used if washed and cleaned
 - o Do not use buckets that have stored chemicals such as paint or pool cleaner
 - o Advertisements on the outside are acceptable
- Liquid laundry detergent
 - o One 50-oz. or two 25-oz. bottle(s) only
- Liquid household cleaner
 - o 12-16 oz. liquid cleaner that can be mixed with water
 - o No spray cleaners
- Dish soap
 - o 16-28 oz. bottle, any brand
- 50 Clothespins
- Clothesline
 - o One 100-ft. or two 50-ft. lines
 - o Cotton or plastic
- 7 Sponges
 - o No cellulose sponges due to mold issues
 - o Remove from packaging
- 24-Roll heavy-duty trash bags
 - o 33-45 gallon sizes
 - o Remove from the box

- 18 Cleaning wipes
 - o Handi-wipes or reusable wipes
 - o No terry cleaning towels
 - o Remove from packaging
- 1 Can air freshener
 - o Aerosol or pump
- 1 Insect-repellant spray
 - o 6-14 oz. aerosol or spray pump with protective cover
- 2 Pairs kitchen dishwashing gloves
 - o Should be durable enough for multiple uses
 - o Remove from packaging
- 1 Pair work gloves
 - o All Cotton
 - o All Leather
 - o Cotton with Leather Palm
- 5 Scouring pads
 - o Remove from wrapper
 - o No stainless steel, Brillo pads or SOS pads (nothing with soap built in)
- 1 Scrub brush
 - o Plastic or wood handle
- 5 Dust masks

Assembly Directions

Place all liquid items in the bucket first. Place remaining items in the bucket fitting them around and between the liquid items. Sponges, scouring pads, clothespins and trash bags can be separated in order to fit all of the items in the bucket. Ensure the lid is closed securely. Important Notes

- All items must be new except for the actual bucket and lid.
- All cleaning agents must be liquid and in plastic containers. No powders, please.
- If you cannot find the requested size of a liquid item, use a smaller size. Including larger sizes of any item will prevent the lid from sealing.
- If all of the items on the list are not included, please put a label on the bucket indicating what has been

Packing and Shipping Kits Instructions

- Box weight: Each packed box cannot exceed 66 pounds.
- Complete 2 packing lists: One for your records and one to put on the shipping box.
- Paste the shipping label / packing list on the outside of each box you send. The shipping list helps the depot to quickly process kits.
- Processing & Shipping Costs: Please enclose an envelope containing at least \$1.50 for each Cleaning Bucket you send. This donation enables Cleaning Buckets to be sent to areas in need.

Church Council Meeting Minutes

August 24, 2017

Attending: Deb Snyder, Chuck Cram, Monte Boardman, Cottie Hood, Liz Chavez

Opened with prayer by Cottie. Liz moved & Monte seconded approval of minutes. Passed.

Old Business

Pumpkin Patch will be Oct. 14-Oct. 31. Discussed avoiding hay bales on the grass. Agreement to move the checkout to the pavement and use weights to anchor the tent; maybe buckets filled with rocks.

New Business

Our next co-hosting of Family Promise is 3 days during the week of Oct. 15 – 21. Gayla Ballantyne notified Cottie that the Outreach group will no longer able to be responsible for Family Promise. Discussion held about the same folks signing up & need to have others help out. Recognizing that this is a form of ministry our church has done and can do, we support the formation of a Family Promise Ministry team (4 - 5 people) to poll the congregation for people to volunteer to provide meals and stay overnight. Having a Ministry Fair was discussed. This would be to recruit and educate folks in opportunities for ministry. The Ministry Fair could be meshed with the Oct. 8 Revitalization Celebration.

Finance Team

As of 19 of August the General Fund and Revitalization reports will be kept separate. We don't have a budget currently; Sue Driskill is doing a rough draft. The Team approved signing up for E Statements. Contract with Cableone for phone & internet has expired; costs will be compared to other providers. There's been no audit for at least 5 years; one will be done for 2017. A report from WesPath is coming soon. The Memorial Fund at P1FCU has \$5563. Funds have been used for scholarships and worship. Sue Driskill volunteered to chair Finance Team for a year. The nodesignated giving policy will bere-visited.

Revitalization

Office remodel design and outside jobs to be done were discussed. Coffee mugs w UMC logo have been ordered, SPR Liz reported that Kris Haynal initiated contact with Chuck about being organist/accompanist/music director. SPR has interviewed and hired her as music director/organist/accompanist at the salary of \$1,000/month beginning in September. After discussion the consensus was approval to create a new position of AV Tech as required by Trustees' Building Use Policy. Beginning in October all MOAs (Memorandums of Agreement) for LFUMC employees will be reviewed and signed by December 31.

Trustees

A church work list to better inform those who may want to help out around the church of things that need attention is posted on the bulletin board outside the office. Parsonage mold problem that resulted in a bathroom rebuild has been taken care of. Chuck furnished the labor. Installation of the new HVAC at the parsonage requires better guarding for the outside basement access stairs to prevent falls into the stairwell.
